Minerals of the Fredrickson Mine, Goodsprings mining district, Clark County, Nevada

ABSTRACT

The Fredrickson Mine is located in the Goodsprings mining district of Clark County, about 50 miles SSW of Las Vegas, Nevada. It was discovered in 1897 by Jesse Jones. The mine has a main inclined tunnel with six different levels that probably produced ore through WWII. From 1909 to 1926 ore from the mine yielded 5,615 ounces of silver, 3,741 pounds of copper, and 205,368 pounds of lead and 559,011 pounds of zinc.

The mine workings lie within the Mississippian-age Yellow Pine member of the Monte Cristo limestone, with mineralization occurring in breccias and faults. Sulfide minerals were oxidized resulting in ore that contained mostly hydrozincite, hemimorphite, and residual galena.

Collecting specimens can be challenging, as the matrix is sometimes quite crumbly, resulting in a frustratingly high number of damaged specimens. Semi-quantitative EDS and/or powder XRD analysis were used to identify minerals and photomicrographs were taken of some of the more spectacular micro-sized specimens. Some of the minerals identified at the mine include aurichalcite, bromargyrite, cerussite, cinnabar, descloizite, dolomite,

fornacite, galena, hemimorphite, hydrozincite, mimetite, minium, mottramite, and rosasite.

SPEAKER'S BACKGROUND

Pat Haynes attended the New Mexico Institute of Mining and Technology, achieving a BS in geology in 1981. Geology positions were sparse at that time so he went to work for a construction company in Cortez, Colorado, where he remained for seventeen years. He has field discovered eight new mineral species: an arsenate in New Mexico, a vanadate in Colorado, and three uranium minerals and three vanadium sulfates in Utah. He has always collected minerals and has authored a few papers, most published in "Rocks and Minerals". Haynes has given talks at the New Mexico Mineral Symposium, held annually in November. He has been a part-time mineral dealer since 1979, and generally has about five hundred species on hand at any time.
