Textbook: Introduction to Paleobiology and the Fossil Record (Benton and Harper) 2nd ed

Course Description: This course is an overview of the history of life as it is preserved in the fossil record. The course is designed for geology and biology students who have already had one or more introductory courses in their respective fields.

Course Objectives:

1. Commit the geologic time scale to memory

- 2. Describe the major features and events in the history of life and when they occurred
- 3. Describe the key aspects of evolution and natural selection
- 4. Describe the processes associated with the postmortem alteration and post-burial alteration of organisms and their impact on the faithfulness of the fossil record (taphonomy)
- 5. Describe the role of the fossil record in understanding evolutionary processes and the testing of competing hypotheses, specifically hypotheses concerning the tempo of evolutionary change (punctuated equilibrium and phyletic gradualism).
- 6. Name and describe the main groups of organisms

Communication: I will primarily communicate using Canvas, so please check your email associated with your Canvas account regularly and **set up Canvas to send you email notifications when announcements are made.** I will not typically read or respond to emails sent after 5pm until the next day, or on the weekends, so I recommend that you don't leave questions until the last minute.

Recorded lectures may not be broadly released to anyone, but made available exclusively to those students enrolled in the class during the particular academic term. Recorded lectures must be stored securely, and are subject to the Nevada System of Higher Education's Records Retention Policy, meaning that the recordings can only be deleted 120 days after the end of class (i.e., after grades are posted). Once this requirement is met, the recordings should be deleted. Class recordings are protected from disclosure, as they are deemed part of an educational record under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).
